

Historical Sketch

AITH Lutheran Church of Lakewood, Ohio, was established by the Home Mission Board of the Evangelical Lutheran Joint Synod of Ohio and other States in the year of our Lord, 1924.

The Rev. Edward W. Schramm accepted a call as missionary to this field while he was still a student at the Theological Seminary of Capital University, Columbus, Ohio. After his graduation he came to Lakewood and conducted the first service in a store room at 15635 Madison Avenue, on the afternoon of September 7, 1924. Services were continued on the following Sundays, and already on October 13, 1924, a constitution was adopted, and Rev. Schramm was officially elected as pastor of the newly-organized church. His installation to office took place on November 16, 1924. Arrangements were also made to worship in the Madison School Building and here the services were conducted until February, 1926.

Several lots were purchased by the congregation on the corner of Hilliard Road and Woodward Avenue during the summer of 1925 for the purpose of erecting a basement church to fill the needs of the congregation for the present. The cornerstone laying for this building took place on December 20, 1925, and the basement church was dedicated on February 21, 1926.

The congregation had occupied its new home for only a few months when it suffered its first sad reverse. The pastor's wife had become ill and it was necessary to grant the pastor an extended leave of absence in order that he might take his wife to another climate. The Rev. J. F. A. Lautenschlager, retired pastor of Massillon, Ohio, was asked to serve the congregation temporarily. He preached his first sermon on November 28, 1926, and remained with the congregation until July 1, 1928.

During this time the pastor's wife had shown little improvement and in May, 1928, the congregation received, and with much regret, accepted the resignation of Rev. Schramm.

At a special meeting on May 20, 1928, the Rev. J. J. Lippoldt, student at the Theological Seminary of Capital University, was tendered a call to

serve the congregation. The call was accepted and the new pastor was installed on July 8, 1928, by Rev. G. C. Gast, D. D., assisted by the Rev. N. A. Menter.

From its very beginning the congregation enjoyed a rapid progress in the point of numerical growth, and by the year 1930 the need for more commodious quarters was very apparent. In February of 1930, at a special meeting of the congregation, it was resolved to appoint a committee to make a survey of the field, to make arrangements for financial assistance, and to make suggestions in regard to further building construction.


A committee of ten men worked on the problem for more than a year and presented-its report to the congregation on the evening of May 7, 1931.

In view of the progress that had been made during the brief existence of the church, and also in view of the opportunities in this locality, it was the opinion of the committee that the original plan could not be carried out, but that the new church should have a greater seating capacity.

Satisfactory financial arrangements had been made with the Home Mission Board and with the Trustees of the American Lutheran Church.

A plan to use as much of the old basement as possible and to provide a church with a seating capacity of more than five hundred, with adequate Sunday school provisions, was presented by Architect W. E. Foster of Cleveland, Ohio. This plan was adopted by the congregation and the contract was awarded to the Vogel-Roeper Construction Company. Work on the new project began shortly. Ground was broken on Tuesday, August 4, 1931. The cornerstone for the new edifice was laid on Sunday, September 27, 1931, the Rev. E. E. Mutschmann delivering the address and the pastor laying the cornerstone.

The work on the new church has progressed rapidly, and today, we are able, by the grace of God, to dedicate our completed sanctuary in His Name and to His glory. May we also re-dedicate our lives to Him as a worthy expression of our love for Him.







O one seeing for the first time, the new building built by Faith Evangelical Lutheran Church, could fail to recognize it as a place of Christian worship. This is as it should be. A church building being visible to all should, by its appearance and design, make manifest to all that mighty but invisible force of Christian faith which has brought it into being. It is easy for us to describe the tangible parts of a church building, but unless we are aware of the intangible influences that have combined to produce them we are in no position to know whether or not the building is a success, viewed from the various angles of religious inspiration, art and beauty. Usability is self-evident and is a quality that should be found in any type of building, and may be taken for granted, so we will not discuss it here.

As a church building has for its prime object the growth of religious experience, the nature of such experience should be given careful thought during the time of its designing. We find that religious experience is largely made up of emotional elements, such as love, joy, hope, awe, and reverence, and these emotions are to a large extent aroused by beauty. Beauty, whether in music, in art, or in character, exerts a tremendous influence on all that come in contact with it, for in it we indistinctively recognize an approach toward perfection that we admire and would fain emulate. With this thought in view, Faith Evangelical Lutheran Church has endeavored to build a place of worship where beauty will be found and felt. Beauty has been produced by careful attention to details, so that no distorted forms, false proportions, or clashing colors will be found to outrage our sense of a fitness of things and by so doing violate our instinctive yearning for perfection.

Recognizing the fact that beautiful music has great power to stir and inspire us, your committee has installed an organ far better than will be found in many churches of greater size and cost. The possibilities for musical expression of this organ are only limited by the skill of the organist.

The Gothic style has been used for the design of this building. Gothic is a style of construction developed during the Christian era. It does not go back to pagan times as most other architectural styles do. Gothic was used by our forefathers for the design of their churches and cathedrals, and so has become so thoroughly associated with the church, that today, even a pointed window on a Christmas card makes us think of a church.

Your building is not a copy of any ancient work. It could not be, for modern requirements are not the same as those of a past age. For example, Sunday schools and social halls are of a very modern origin. Although Faith Church is modern in design and utility, nevertheless it recalls the past and reminds us that our religion had its beginnings long ago; was handed down to us by our fathers; has endured through the ages, and is not a thing of the moment.

Limestone was chosen for the outside walls because of its beauty and permanence. Slate was used on the roof for the same reason. As time passes the wisdom of this choice will become more and more apparent, for time and weather will not detract from their beauty.

As we enter the church we find ourselves in a well-lighted building, with an open timber roof. On either hand are rows of stone arches, which divide the nave from wide side aisles. Faith Church has made no attempt to copy the great cathedrals, a mistake too commonly made by American churches, but has frankly turned to the parish churches of England for its inspiration. The result is an atmosphere of quiet reverence, from which sham and pretense are entirely lacking.

The church itself will seat five hundred, and is arranged for a chancel choir of twenty-four. The organ is played from the chancel. A large social hall has been provided in the basement in which three hundred and fifty can dine at one time. The social hall is equipped with a stage and also a kitchen. An adequate number of classrooms have been provided for the Sunday school.

Whether or not Faith Church is correctly designed, time alone can tell. If in the future we find the work of the church broadening and the congregation growing, and if this building becomes dear to the members and their interest in it grows as it becomes more intimately associated with their life, then all those who have had a part in this work will know that they have builded well.

Description of Organ

HE pipe organ in Faith Lutheran Church has been especially designed and built for our Church by The Reuter Organ Company of Lawrence, Kansas. The Reuter firm is widely noted throughout the country as builders of organs of exceptional fineness, and that their reputation for work of unusually high quality is well deserved, is readily shown by the fineness of the instrument they have built for Faith Church.


The personnel of the Reuter Company is one of outstanding character. Composed of men who are recognized as among the real leaders of the country in matters pertaining to organ building, these men have combined their technical abilities into a guild, which for master craftmanship, has probably never been excelled in this country. Of added interest to our people is the fact that the personnel of the Reuter organization consists largely of men who are Lutherans, and many of them, including Mr. Reuter himself, are also former Ohioans.

The organ installed in our church is a three manual instrument, consisting of four separate divisions; namely, the Great, Swell, Choir, and Pedal. The speaking pipes of the organ are arranged in two large chambers. Behind the two grilles in the trancept, and the one in the Chancel, are the tone openings through which the tone of the organ has egress into the church auditorium. Into these openings are fitted expression shutters or louvres, and which are electrically operated from the two expression pedals at the console. Through the effect of these shades, perfect control of the volume of tone from any set of pipes in the organ, can be secured at the will of the organist.

In the organ are thirty-three speaking stops, representing a total of 1,439 speaking pipes. In addition the organ also contains a set of Chimes of twenty tubular bells and a Harp Celeste of forty-nine metal bars. The pipes range in size from the longest, which is about eighteen feet in length and practically large enough for a person to get into it, down to the shortest, whose speaking length is only about one-fourth of an inch, and the diameter smaller than a lead pencil.

Among the sets of pipes in the organ are many beautiful voices, among which are the exquisitely delicate Erzahler, the Dopple or Double Flute, the Unda Maris, the Vox Humana, the Clarinet, and numerous others. The selection of stops, or sets of pipes, is arranged much as one would arrange the orchestration of a large symphony orchestra. There are the strings, the flutes and woodwind, and the brass. In addition the organ has the Diapasons which impart the solidity and dignity to the tonal structure. Most noticeable about the voicing of the Reuter organ is the remarkable sweetness and richness of its tone.

Besides the many stops in the organ its equipment includes twenty-two couplers, eighteen Adjustable Combination Pistons, three expression pedals, including the Grand Crescendo Pedal, and numerous other accessories to facilitate the playing of the organ.
